

They Built It. No One Came.

Reminiscent of a Monty Python sketch...Radiating warmth and with a very tight script, They Built It. No One Came is a style of storytelling that sits perfectly within its 1-hour time slot. - **British Theatre Guide**

Synopsis

"Neither of us were very charismatic... that was a problem."

Eight years ago Tobias and Alexander came together to form a spiritualist commune based on their shared visions of a peaceful and harmonious community...they are still awaiting their first member.

They Built It. No One Came was inspired by a true story originally published in the New York Times under the same name by Penelope Green in 2015.

It was shortlisted for the Charlie Hartill Award in early 2016. It subsequently went on to preview at the New Diorama Theatre in July in London before going on to a successful run at the Pleasance for the duration of the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in August 2016.

It is a tragi-comedy devised by Fledgling Theatre Company and written by Callum Cameron, with original music written and composed by Ben Maier and directed by Lucy Wray. The piece was performed by Callum Cameron, Christopher Neels, Edoardo Elia, and Patrick Holt.

This was Fledgling Theatre's first show for the Fringe and managed to sell out it's preview at the New Diorama in London before going on to sell out over half of it's 25 productions in the 56 seat Bunker Two venue in the Pleasance Courtyard, Edinburgh.

As Fledgling Theatre's first show at the Edinburgh Fringe and with little publicity behind it 'They Built It. No One Came.' operated at a capacity of 66% over the course of the Fringe. It filled 1007 of it's allocated 1512 seats with an average audience of 40 out of a possible 56 in the Pleasance Bunker Two throughout the festival.

The production was mounted on a shoe string budget of £4,500 – of which £3,200 was crowdsourced using a brand new funding platform Fringe Funder, Fledgling Theatre were one of the first 5 companies to use the site and were able to raise 100% of our allocated funds from it.

We were also supported financially by ANZUK Teaching Agency, who we have developed a relationship with over our last two productions.





Our preview at the New Diorama in London was operating under an agreement of 100% of the box office takings, less £100 off of the first call. We sold out at a capacity of 76 seats making a total of £863.50.

For the production with Pleasance we were running the show at a 55/45 in our favor, or until we make a total of £2,360. Our total revenue from ticket sales over the month before the split was £7,078 with £4,688.50 made from full price tickets and £2,389.50 from concessions. Far exceeding our predicted revenues before the festival.

The Company

Fledgling Theatre Company is an international theatre company based in both London and Sydney, formed by Callum Cameron, Christopher Neels, Chris Huntley-Turner and Patrick Holt in 2013, all of whom graduated from the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama in London. We focus on developing new writing and devising work as an ensemble.

Fledgling Theatre's previous shows include *Modern Jesus* performed at the Nursery Theatre in London in 2014 which focused on a group of disillusioned and unemployed 20 somethings in contemporary London with no where to direct their aggression and *Jericho Creek* performed at The Cockpit in London in 2015, a tale of religious fanaticism in colonial Australia inspired by the works of Nick Cave. For the development of *Jericho Creek* we were supported by Room One Studios in London.

Fledgling Theatre have a core of 12 actors and creatives that we work with but the majority of the writing, directing and producing is carried out by Callum Cameron, Christopher Neels and Patrick Holt. 'They Built It. No One Came.' was directed by Lucy Wray who is Assosciate Director with METIS, touring the UK autumn 2016 with World Factory (Young Vic / New Wolsey) and Co-Artistic Director of the theatre companies Populace and Heavy Weather. She is also a script reader at the New Work Department of the National Theatre.

Community dream becomes a nightmare

They Built It. No One Came. Pleasance Courtyard (Venue 33)

On the fringes of a small American town, two gay men set up a commune, based on principles of harmony, freedom and working the land using traditional 18th century German techniques. They never had a single member. Inspired by a true story reported in the New York Times, Fledgling Theatre has created a deceptively profound little play.

Eight years after founding their community, Tobias (Christopher Neels) and Alexander (Patrick Holt) are still on their own. Life is tough: there is no electricity or indoor plumbing, and they face frequent assaults on their premises by homophobic neighbours.

When, finally, Pablo (Callum Cameron, who is also the writer) does attempt to join them he finds them, on the one hand, unnervingly welcoming and, on the other, rather set in their ways. It's not surprising that things

take a turn for the worse. Directed by Lucy Wray, with endearing folky songs accompanied by musician/ performer Edoardo Elia, the production strikes just the right note. It would be all too easy to be sardonic about Tobias and Alexander and their failed attempt at hippiedom, but the story is handled

with gentleness and empathy. The life of the community, from its idealistic beginnings to its collapse in bitterness and recrimination, is told succinctly, with humour and compassion.

In the midst of the idealistic daftness of it all, the liberal quoting of Walt Whitman, the homespun flax shirts and attempts to farm near-barren land using hoes and scythes, are some profound questions about how we are capable of undermining our own best intentions, and how far we might have to compromise our ideals in order to get others to share them.


