An urgent and provocative story about human relationships, communications and our impact on the natural world.

Scientist Steve is on a long haul flight. His partner has just left him. Travelling home on a crowded aeroplane across the Atlantic, he feels suddenly dislocated and alone. In a world of touch screens and social robots, he has lost the ability to make meaningful bonds with other people.

He makes a decision that will eventually force him to face his own inability to make a connection. He decides to talk to the nervous passenger sitting next to him.

In a forest thousands of miles away a sapling pokes its head through the leafy forest floor. Beneath the soil its roots begin to scramble for the one thing that quarantees its survival - a connection.

Blending stunning visuals and urgent storytelling, Economy of Ecology uncovers the power of human touch and the unexpected links between all things: from a man on an aeroplane who is scared of flying, to the underground fungal networks of Oregon's Blue Mountains.

The Economy of Ecology has been created with support from and in association with Enable US at University of Sheffield where Manic Chord Theatre are a resident company. Supported using public funding by the National Lottery through Arts Council England. Originally presented in

association with the West Yorkshire Playhouse.



WHAT'S IT LIKE FOR THE AUDIENCE?

The Economy of Ecology sits at the crossroads between highly visual, beautiful storytelling and performance lecture, full of colour, poetry and a little bit of actual science. It explores the role of touch in our lives. It asks us to join the central characters as they make their

flight across the Atlantic, interspersed with tree scientist Steve offering evolving insights into his field of expertise.

The show ends with an invitation to hold the hand of the person next to us in the audience, allowing us to finally make a genuine connection.

Manic Chord was formed in 2013 by Leeds University graduates Alex Monk, David Cartwright and Sam Berrill. Our unique ensemble practice blends strong visuals with lyrical storytelling, playful humour and a keen engagement with our social and political surroundings. To date we have produced three shows. After What Comes Before premiered at the Incoming Festival, before a stint at the Edinburgh Fringe and a short national tour.

This was followed by *Don't Let Go*. Giving the show five stars, EDFRINGE REVIEW said "every aspect is brilliant." This success resulted in a commission from West Yorkshire Playhouse for *Treading Water*, which explored issues of gender discrimination in sport.

Most recently, we embarked on an ACE-supported development period for new piece *This is Yesterday*, a remarkable cross-platform theatre and digital project drawing on the experiences of people with dementia, supported by Arts Depot, West Yorkshire Playhouse, Square Chapel, Halifax and Slung Low.
